Gardening - Can palms thrive in my Swanbourne Garden?



Yes! Two species of fan palm will thrive in Swanbourne.

Trachycarpus fortuneii and Trachycarpus wagneriensis will be fine even with winter temperatures as low as minus 15 degrees C. However, no other fan palm species are likely to survive really low temperatures.

Palms continued



Trachycarpus fortuneii is very similar except the fan leaf tips are less rigid so they often droop. Available in most garden centres.

Cordyline, the cabbage palm, will also do well in Swanbourne, but in the most severe winters the main stems might die. However, the roots do not die and should give rise to new small palms once again the following year. Small examples are sometimes confused with yucca plants.

Swanbourne Home Farm News May 2022

I was asked to do a mini 'news' update from the Farm, for those in the village who might not be connected to farming but interested in what is happening at the moment. There is far too much to write on one page, so here are a few facts and ditties:

David E., Stuart G. and Stewart B. have been busy with fencing, particularly at Church Farm. The farm is now part of Swanbourne Home Farms and is within a conservation scheme (Countryside Stewardship Scheme.) Work will include gapping up hedges and planting new hedges. The recently cultivated land is for the planting of a legume and herb rich sward (if we get more rain) – great for wildlife and better for locking in carbon. There are also some field areas which have been fenced off and allowed to grow wild, in order to protect the water courses. None of these fields are fertilised, following the organic regime from when the land was farmed by Stephen Alderman. Taking of fertiliser – there has been much in the news about costs to farmers. Fertiliser costs rose from £250 per tonne last year, to £1,000 this year, with agro-chemicals rising significantly, and of course fuel (of which tractors use quite a bit!)

Some people have asked why we no longer grow oilseed rape. Rape seed used to be treated with a chemical (Neonicotinoids) to deter flea beetle. This was banned as it can affect bees, but this means that our rape crops are decimated by the pest, and generally not viable. So we grow bread making wheat (as opposed to animal feed,) milling oats (for cereals and muesli bars,) beans (for animal feed or export to the Middle East – mostly Egypt, for cooking, falafel etc.) We are also growing rye for the first time. This is for pig feed – the pigs digest rye more slowly, keeping them satisfied and less aggressive.

Last autumn we also planted up quite a few areas of less productive arable land with grass and wildflowers, which will take a little time to establish, but will be good for bees and wildlife.

What about food prices? There is much in the news at the moment concerning the cost of food. Dairy, grain and meat prices have been very competitive for consumers over many years in the UK, and usually below the cost of production for most farmers. UK wheat is often the cheapest in the world. However bad weather with successive poor harvests, and with land being used for environmental use, building etc, the UK is becoming a net importer of most types of food. A growing number of crops are being used for fuel and other uses, meaning demand is now greater than supply. Throw in the cost of fuel and fertiliser, and the cost of production is even higher. Then

- Russia and Ukraine export around 35 million tonnes of wheat, putting a hole in the supply (which will particularly affect north Africa.) It means that most countries will want to hold on to their commodities for strategic stocks - so less supply, and higher prices.

Still – the sun is shining as I write this! *Tom F*

Wildlife watch - protecting our pond life

Great crested newts need ponds and their habitats are fully protected under the Conservation of Habitats and Species Regulations 2017 (as amended). It is therefore illegal to deliberately capture, injure, kill, disturb or take great crested newts or to damage or destroy breeding sites or resting places. Under the Wildlife and Countryside Act 1981 (as amended) it is illegal to intentionally or recklessly disturb any great crested newts occupying a place of shelter or protection, or to obstruct access to any place of shelter or protection (see the legislation or seek legal advice for full details).

Local wildlife trusts advise that dogs should not be allowed to go into ponds, as they may well damage their delicate ecosystems.
